
The GDHM consists of 23 standard indicators aligned to the WHO/ITU eHealth Strategy Toolkit and WHO Global Strategy on Digital Health:

- Standards & interoperability
- Infrastructure
- Services & applications

- Private sector companies de-risk investments by having visibility into the state of enablers needed for digital health interventions to be scaled and sustained within and across countries
